

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
Winter on the Barrens was pretty harsh this year. There was very little activity on the DNR SnapShot trail camera from December well into February that the FNBWA sponsors and monitors . Snowstorms in late December began the piling up of the snow, and there were a good two feet on the ground when the camera was checked in February. A few deer showed up for camera shoots in early December, but the surprise was the Sharp-tailed Grouse activity in front of the camera the first week of January. For several days there were numerous pictures of the birds, especially in the mornings. From then on until the camera was checked in February no critters showed up. #### SAND AND FIRE

The Wisconsin Historical Society Press has just published a book on the Namekagon Barrens. It's called "Sand and Fire" and was written by FNBWA board member Dave Peters. The book covers the natural history of the barrens – from glaciers to the network of plants and animals present today – and the robust human history as well.

Indigenous people have been on the land for thousands of years. And fur traders, stagecoach companies, loggers, land promoters, immigrant farmers, foresters and wildlife habitat managers all have left their mark. For a short time 100 years ago, what today is mostly empty countryside visited by few was a buzzing little community. The book explores how through it all the character of this special place has been determined mainly by two things: the sand carried here by glaciers more than 12,000 years ago and fire – wildfires and those set by humans for many, many years.

## 4/16/23 – Viewing blinds are up and roads and parking areas are accessible
